



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# Farmtastic Stuff Is Happening

It is spring and OASIS farm is growing! We took a break from reconstructing three greenhouses to attend the Adventist Agriculture Conference in Glen Rose, TX for five days in January with our two students, Zebedee and Adam. It was a wonderful experience as we attended four classes each day in addition to meetings every evening. The spiritual environment was on fire and the knowledge base was incredible! We returned with a zeal to move forward and apply what we had learned. One new inspired project is to host a gardening class for children during the public school spring break. They will learn how to plant seeds and repot plants. Each child will be able to take home their tray of seeds and a potted plant. We are hoping to make new community connections and touch hearts.

We are very excited about the 3000 asparagus plants that were planted by the whole school three years ago. This spring will be the first harvest! The strawberry fields are doing well and we are planning to have a u-pick strawberry patch this year. We will also be selling strawberry plants individually and in hanging fabric containers. In addition, the flower seeds are sprouting and we are hoping to have many hanging baskets filled with beautiful flowers along with many bedding flowers to

sell. Currently, there is delicious green leafy lettuce growing in the greenhouse, and it is available for sale in The Country Store.

The plant trailer will be back in action this spring with many opportunities to sell at various new farmers' markets. We are hoping to attend three markets a week and also to begin a CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) program. Dan Brooks and Pat Nelson will join us in the spring to sell and minister to the community.

Zebedee and Adam have worked very hard this year, planting, plowing, and building greenhouses in the heat of the summer and the freezing cold winter. We appreciate their perseverance especially when the environmental conditions were not the best! These two young men will be joining the Aviation Mission Program next year as juniors. The farm will be launching our own Agriculture Mission Program next school year. Students that are juniors will be able to apply for this program and will study from the new Adventist Acquainting Agriculture curriculum and apply that knowledge on the farm. Following graduation, they will serve in the mission field for 9 months.

This is our spring outlook! Please pray for the farm's mission to reach people for Jesus with fresh healthy food and kindness!

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# **Aviation Moves Forward!**

"An extra 1,000 feet! What would we ever do with that much extra length? We'll have to back-taxi for, like, forever..."

"2,500 feet! That's almost half a mile long. That's like forever... Maybe we could take off and land again... a couple of times...." And so the students' banter goes.

Bush pilots have a mantra: runway behind you is worthless. After learning to fly comfortably from our short, grass runway, our flight students know that using every inch of runway counts. Most experienced pilots would consider us crazy for training students from a 1,300' grass strip, but it's what we have. Well, it's what we've had... But by the time you receive this newsletter, we will have closed on the runway extension property - a large field bordering us to the south. It's a real miracle - an answer to lots of prayer. By God's grace through generous supporters, we have enough money in hand to move forward with the down payment. Our Purchase Agreement stipulates that we will still need to pay about \$152,000 a year for the next three years to pay off the 49.2-acre field, but we have a start and we're moving forward in faith.

So what does this mean for Oklahoma Academy and the missions program? In short, it's a game-changer. The runway will almost double in length to about 2,500 feet. The current short runway has some significant drawbacks for training. There's just not enough margin for error with only 1,300 feet. Student pilots do not get to make solo flights from our current runway and they can't use it for night flight operations. Extending the runway will make all this training possible. An added benefit is that we will be able to use small, lower-powered, inexpensive airplanes more safely in our training, with lots more margin of safety for errors.

But the advantages don't end there. With the additional property, we now have the space to build a hangar. Finally, a secure place to keep our planes, tools, and equipment all in one place, sheltered from the weather. We are currently housing the planes under the roof of the picnic shelter in OASIS park. I dream of the day when we can return picnic tables to the picnic pavilion. A large cement pad around the new hangar will provide a place to pull the airplanes in and out of the hangar. And a fuel tank on the pad will mean that a fuel company could come to campus and deliver 500 gallons of fuel at a time. No more sitting on the wing pouring in fuel, five gallons at a time.

And then there's the rest of the property... We plan to build more permanent houses for staff along an By Clifton Brooks (Flight instructor and Ground School teacher)

extension of Academy Lane. (I say permanent because many of our staff are in outdated mobile homes and other borrowed, temporary accommodations.) The space also allows us to expand as needed - building more classroom space for students in the mission tracks, making a nature walking trail, etc. And, of course, (in typical OA fashion) our goal is to build as many of these facilities as we can in-house giving our students excellent training opportunities for mission service.






Above: Concept art for the new hanger. The east end at the top and west end, middle.


At the right, the red line indicates the new piece of property we are purchasing. You can see the concept for extended roads, more staff housing, and the new hanger beside the extended runway.


















#### **BIBLES FOR PRISONERS**
